


We hope you're enjoying the VideoGroove**

This is about when I went pool skating. It reminded me of how fun it is to just roll around, not worrying about complicated tricks that don't really have anything to do with what we do...which is skate.








Tim Ward



HERE ARE SOME TIPS THAT WE THOUGHT WE'D PASS ALONG TO EVERYONE OUT THERE THAT'S FILMING OR WOULD LIKE TO FILM FOR VG. THESE ARE SOME THINGS THAT WE'VE LEARNED ALONG THE WAY THAT HELPS YOUR FOOTAGE MAKE THE CUT TO A FINAL VG EDIT. HAPPY FILMING!

- 1. USE AN 8MM, HIB OR DIGITAL CAMCORDER. UHS OR UHS-C IS NOT RECOMMENDED
- 2. CARRY AT LEAST ONE EXTRA BATTERY WITH YOU AT ALL TIMES. THERE'S NOTHING WORSE THAN LOSING A SHOT BECAUSE YOU'RE OUT OF POWER.
- 3. IF YOU HAVE A HI8 CAMERA, USE A HI8 TAPE, NOT 8MM. HI8 TAPES ARE TWICE AS GOOD IN QUALITY AND HAVE MUCH BETTER RESOLUTION.
- 4. NEUER USE AUTO-FOCUS. AUTO FOCUS USES YOUR BATTERIES UP QUICKER AND DOESN'T WORK VERY WELL FOR FAST MOVING ACTION. TO FOCUS MANUALLY, 200M INTO YOUR FURTHEST POINT, FOCUS, THEN PULL YOUR 200M OUT. ALSO, TRY FOCUSING TO INFINITY (TURN COUNTER CLOCKWIJSE) AND SHOOT WITH THE 200M IN THE WIDEST POSITION.
- 5. LOG YOUR FOOTAGE. KNOWING WHERE YOUR GOOD SHOTS ARE SAUES A LOT OF TIME. TO LOG, REWIND THE TAPE ALL THE WAY TO THE BEGINNING, THEN HIT ZERO RESET OR COUNTER RESET. PUSH PLAY, AND LOG YOUR SHOTS BY SUBJECT, LOCATION, DESCRIPTION AND OF COURSE BY THE TIME ON THE COUNTER. USE A SYMBOL LIKE A STAR OR A RED MARK TO IDENTIFY THE BEST SHOTS.
- 6. A WIDE ANGLE LENS IS A MUST FOR ANYONE THAT IS FILMING SKATING. GET A LENS THAT HAS AT LEAST THE SAME DIAMETER AS THE LENS THAT CAME ON YOUR CAMERA. IF YOU HAVE A 52MM LENS DIAMETER LENS AND YOU PUT ON A 49MM WIDE ANGLE YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE AN ANNOYING BLACK CIRLCE SHADOW ON THE EDGES OF ALL OF YOUR SHOTS. TAKE YOUR TIME IN SHOPPING FOR A WIDE ANGLE AND FIND ONE THAT PROPERLY FITS YOUR CAMERA.
- 7. ALWAYS CHECK YOUR CAMERA LENS FOR DIRT AND DUST. EVERY ONCE In a while give it a quick wipe with a soft cloth (a good cotton tshirt will work) or use lens paper from a camera store.
- 8. NEVER SEND IN EDITED TAPES ALONE. INCLUDE YOUR LOGGED RAW FOOTAGE FOR BETTER OVALITY.
- 9. FILM EVERYTHING. NEW SPOTS, FACES, TRICKS & STUPID STUFF.



"A book that's easy to read, easy to understand and possibly the single most influential life-changing novel you'll ever read."

This article is a book review and a life story all wrapped into one. This here. VG, is everything to me. It is my path and power source. The people are the magic and the movement here is tangible. Sometimes I can almost see it. I hope you understand what I'm saying. Get in your Groove. Find your path in life. Your real destiny calls out from inside. Follow it. Realize there is more to life than fame, fortune and the pursuit of what someone else wants from you. We need to spread the message from person to person. Kind of a positive psychological contagion among people. The truth is in front of you. -dap
